## ALL ENTRY FEES PAID OUT IN PRIZE MONEY

## PASSES FOR ATTENDANTS TO LIVESTOCK

Passes will be given out by the Secretary when entry fees are paid according to the amount of entry fees paid to the Society.
-CATTLE-
One to Five Animals ........... Two Passes
Six and Over Animals ........ Three Passes

-SWINE AND SHEEP-<br>Over Ten Animals ......... Three Passes

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are required to read the following rules carefully and send in their entries as soon as possible. Be sure that all entry fees are sent with entry forms.

## ADMISSION TO THE GROUNDS

The price of admission for adults will be $\$ 12.00$ for each day and children 12 and under FREE. Weekend Packages can be obtained from the office or the gate. Cost of Weekend Package: \$30.00

## NO DOGS ALLOWED ON THE GROUNDS.

## MEMBERSHIP

The membership fee is $\$ 12.00$ (Adult, 13 years and over). All exhibitors to purchase Membership Cards. Each Adult Exhibitor to receive a One Day Pass. If you wish to upgrade to a Weekend Package the cost is an additional \$10.

## JUDGING TO COMMENCE AT 9:00 A.M. FIRST DAY OF FAIR - AUGUST 31 ${ }^{\text {sT }}$

POULTRY \& SHEEP - AUGUST 31 ${ }^{\text {sT }}$
BEEF CATTLE \& SWINE - SEPT $1^{\text {ST }}$
DAIRY CATTLE - SEPT $2^{\text {ND }}$
Only one bedding of straw supplied by Society.
It is desired that all entries be made on pre-printed forms, which may be obtained free of charge from the secretary or found in the prize list (see page 51/52 \& $57 / 58$ ). These forms, accompanied by all necessary fees, and to be filled out, including the indemnity release signed by the Exhibitor, and delivered to the Secretary by the appropriate date.

ALL Poultry Entry Forms are due August 14th (Poultry are classes 36 to 46 \& Junior class J89)

## All Other Entry Forms are due August 26th (the Saturday before the fair)

No email entries will be accepted.
Entries and indemnity releases may be faxed to the secretary. Faxed entries will be accepted until 8:00 p.m. on the day they are due.

## ALL FEES MUST BE PAID BEFORE ENTRY TICKET WILL BE ISSUED!

All animals in the livestock classes must be the property of the exhibitor at the time of making the entry, except the draft pony hitch (each must own a team). Entry to be made in one exhibitor's name only.

All livestock exhibitors must provide proof of liability insurance.

Judges are particularly requested, in all cases, not to award premiums to any article or animal not worthy of a prize.

All horses and cattle must be tied up and other stock placed in position as directed by the committee in charge.

Cattle, sheep and swine are not to be removed from barns before 4:00 p.m. on the last day. Poultry, rabbits, ducks, geese, and pigeons are not to be removed before 5:00 p.m. on the last day. Exhibitors not adhering to the above rules will forfeit their winnings.

Livestock must be paraded before the Judges for examination. No interference with the Judges will be allowed during the examination.

All articles in halls to be exhibited, must be in position by 9:00 p.m. on Wednesday.

## NO ARTICLE TO BE REMOVED FROM MAIN HALL, ARTS \& CRAFT BUILDING \& SCOUT HALL BEFORE 5:00 P.M. ON THE LAST DAY!

The decison of the judge will be final. Appeals will not be considered. Exhibitors interfering with the judging will forfeit their winnings.
All exhibits must be picked up by their rightful owner unless otherwise arranged through the office. Persons picking up other exhibitors articles must sign for, and accept responsibility for these articles.

## -EXTRACT FROM BY-LAWS-

Any member exhibiting an article not his bonafide property shall forfeit all prizes awarded at the Fair, and shall be prohibited from exhibiting for a period of two years. All Agricultural and Horticultural produce exhibited within the year in which the exhibition is held, except clover seed, soybeans and corn, and all manufactured articles must be manufactured by the exhibitor within the same period, and any exhibitor who shall be known to exhibit any article or product manufacture that is not his own production or manufacture, shall forfeit all prizes that he may be awarded at the Fair, and shall be precluded from exhibiting for a period of two years.
No prizes awarded to articles not mentioned in the Prize List. In case there is a shortage of gate receipts, the Directors have decided to pay a percentage of the Prize Money instead of the full amount.

NOTE: No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than two entries in any section of a class in the Exhibition Hall, unless otherwise stated; or more than two entries in cattle, sheep, poultry and hogs. - This rule does not apply to horses. - Any entry under an A.O.V. (any other variety) must be correctly named.
Any soiled, defaced or old work will not be judged .
Though the Board of Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent for
exhibition, they wish it distinctly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them and should any exhibits be accidently injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power toward the recovery of the same, but will not make payment for the value thereof.
To collect your merchandise prizes for specials, please take the certificate you receive from the Harrow Fair (they are mailed with prize money cheques) to the business that sponsored the special.
For specials we have indicated which sections they pertain to.
Any information collected by the Colchester South and Harrow Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons related directly to the business of the Colchester South and Harrow Agricultural Society and the Harrow Fair, will be solely used for the purposes of promotion of the Colchester South and HarrowAgricultural Society and the Harrow Fair, and for the maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Colchester South and Harrow Agricultural Society and the Harrow Fair, that the names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

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## HARROW FAIR - EXHIBITOR FACT SHEET

## Membership

Exhibitor membership (\$12.00) entitles you to enter no more than TWO entries in any section of each class in Exhibition Hall, unless otherwise stated, and ONE entry in any section for Arts \& Crafts, Needle Arts and Photography.

Each exhibitor will receive a one-day pass. To upgrade to a weekend pass is an additional \$10. Juniors require a membership. (no charge)
If you are a Junior entering in an adult class you must purchase an adult membership. Junior is 12 years and under. You are not eligible for a pass.
Everyone will need to purchase a new membership every year.

## Prize Lists

The prize list will be available on the fair web site (www.harrowfair.com) and at select locations after July 13th.

## Entry Forms

All entries are to be made on the pre-printed forms accompanied by necessary fees (poultry). *Please read rules and regulations and sign entry form.

Entry forms are to be submitted by Saturday, August 26th, 2023 so that the tags may be prepared for you ahead of time. (see note below)

Mail or Fax entry form early. No e-mail entries.
Entries will not be accepted after 8:00 pm Saturday, August 26th

## Entries

Entries must be placed in Main Hall, Arts \& Craft Building, Lions (Scout) Hall \& Poultry Barn between 10:00 am and 9:00 pm Wednesday, August 30th, 2023.

## Reclaiming Entries

You must reclaim your entries on Sunday, September 3rd between 5:00 pm and 6:30 pm. (You may need your membership card.) Domestic Science reserves the right to discard moldy, bacteria ladden exhibits.

## Prize Money

Prize money will be mailed to you approximately 4 weeks after the Fair. Please cash cheques promptly (by December 31)

## Jesse T Thursday, August 31-8:00pm

JESSIE T packs a punch - she's the kind of girl you can take home to mama but she'll also bring a bottle of tequila to Thanksgiving dinner. Jessie's FACTOR funded debut album "Reckless Heart" was released September 2016 and produced by award-winning producer J.Richard Hutt (Northern Pikes, Tom Cochrane, Jamie Warren). She released 4 singles from this project, with the third "Helbound" reaching \#100 on the BDS charts.

With the mind of a songwriter and the heart of a performer, her music walks you through finding love, experiencing heartbreak and looks at everyday human experiences from a different and more intimate perspective. This album helped solidify Jessie as a competitor in the music industry and plant her roots within Canada's country music scene.


Whether performing live or virtually, Jessie leaves it all on the stage. Since moving from Kingston to Kitchener in 2012, Jessie has been headlining venues and festivals across Ontario, most notably performing Manitoulin Country Fest (2019), JUNO Host City Music Exchange (2019), Trackside Music Festival (2018) and KW 50th Oktoberfest alongside Dallas Smith for a duo performance of Smith's hit song 'One Drink Ago' (2018).

Jessie has also played stages alongside some of the best in Canadian country music including Paul Brandt, Jess Moskaluke, James Barker Band, The Reklaws, Michelle Wright, Adam Gregory, Steve Wilkinson (The Wilkinsons), and Beverley Mahood (LACE). Most recently, she has joined Jason Blaine 's band as a background vocalist supporting his 2022 shows. Jessie T is releasing her highly anticipated second studio album in spring 2023. "This is the album that l've always wanted to release," says Jessie, "I'm very excited for this new music to be heard and to share more of myself with all of you".

# Genevieve Fisher Friday, September 1-8:00 pm 



London born and raised, Genevieve Fisher, has earned 9 top 50 hits on both Billboard's BDS and Mediabase Canadian National Country Charts. In 2021, Genevieve achieved the most consecutive weeks on the national chart of her career. Her name entered onto the top 40, starting with the David James duet "Then There's You". This was immediately followed by her own solo top 40 hit "Playing Favourites". It was also the first time that her name appeared in the top 40 with two different songs at the same time. Genevieve has earned recognition within the Canadian Country Music scene by earning 7 Female Artist of the Year nominations as well as numerous nominations for Single of the Year and Songwriter of the Year at the Country Music Association of Ontario Music Awards. While still in her teens, The Canadian Country Music Association recognized Genevieve's emerging talent with her CCMA performance selection at the 2012 New Artist Showcase in Saskatoon. Her songwriting skills continue to be acknowledged by the CCMA as witnessed by her selection to perform for the prestigious Songwriters Series in 2016 and 2018. Her Indigenous background has allowed her to register 3 number 1 hits on the North American Indigenous Music Countdown chart. Genevieve has had the opportunity to perform at some of the biggest music festivals in Canada including Boots and Hearts, Havelock Jamboree, Lucknow Music In The Fields, Manitoulin Country Fest, Trackside and Indigenous Day Live. She has had, and continues to have, the privilege of writing with some of Country music's brightest songwriters including Aaron Goodvin, Jason Blaine, Steven Lee Olsen, Patricia Conroy, Michelle Wright, Jason Massey, Jennifer Schott and many more.

# Michelle Wright Saturday, September 2-8:00 pm 

Like so many country artists Michelle Wright cut her teeth playing six nights a week in clubs across Canada. In 1988, after teaming with Savannah Records President Brian Ferriman, Savannah Records released her first CD, Do Right By Me, in Canada, and Michelle and her band set off to tour North America. Do Right By Me was a major hit in her homeland, with seven chart singles and over 40,000 copies sold. That success opened many doors, including at the brand new Arista/Nashville label. Arista/ Nashville made Michelle one of its flagship artists, and in 1990, they released her first U.S. album, Michelle Wright. American audiences responded immediately and enthusiastically to "that girl singer from up north with the snow in her videos," and her first single, "New Kind Of Love," became her first Top Thirty American hit.

In 1992, Arista released Now \& Then. Now \& Then,
 which produced a total of six singles included, including "One Time Around," "Guitar Talk," "He Would Be Sixteen," and the song that changed everything, "Take It Like A Man." "Take It Like A Man," was released in February of 1992 and in less than a year, Michelle became the first Canadian-born artist in the modern era of country music to have a Top Ten hit in America, a Number One video on CMT-USA (also for "Take It Like A Man") and to win a major U.S. music industry award (the Academy of Country Music Top New Female Vocalist award in 1992). The song also catapulted Michelle to superstardom, receiving a total of twelve music industry awards, including the 1993 Canadian Country Music Association's Fans' Choice Entertainer Of The Year award and double platinum honors for Now \& Then the same year.

The career that followed is one that many artists dream of having. She has walked to podiums in music centers like Los Angeles and Toronto to accept more than forty major awards, including her 2011 induction into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame. A total of twelve album releases have sold millions of copies and produced twenty-five Top Ten radio hits. Michelle enjoys an international career that has seen her grace concert stages across North America, Europe, Africa, South America, Australia, and Asia.

Working with producer Bob Funk (the husband of one of the newest inductees into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame, Patricia Conroy), she recorded nine brand new songs, including the lead single, "Small Town. The second single, "Heartbreak Song," lays bare the misery of surviving the end of a relationship. The song was cowritten with Texas Hills' Adam Wakefield, who also appears in the song's music video. Milestone showcases the distinctive musical style that has been the hallmark of her career. One of the highlights of the new release is Wright's new recording of the classic "Take It Like A Man"

## Homemade German Sauerkraut

Fermentation Time: 250 hrs Yield: 1 quart

With this easy recipe, you can adjust the yield to your liking since each batch ferments in a 1-quart Mason jar. It can take anywhere from one to three weeks to achieve a nice sour tartness in your sauerkraut; in the cool temperatures of winter, it will take longer, and in the warm days of summer, it will go more quickly.

## Ingredients

- 8 to 10 cups loosely packed shredded cabbage (about 2 pounds)
- 10 juniper berries
- 1 teaspoon caraway seeds
- 1 teaspoon mustard seeds
- 3 teaspoons pickling salt, or other non-iodized salt, divided
- 1 cup filtered water


## Steps to Make It

1. In a clean, non-metallic bowl, mix together the cabbage, juniper berries, caraway seeds, mustard seeds, and 2 teaspoons of the pickling salt.
2. Stir to release the cabbage's juices.
3. Let it rest for 10 minutes and then mix again. If needed, you can let it rest longer, as much as 1 to 2 hours.
4. Sterilize a 1-quart, wide-mouthed Mason jar and the lid by boiling for several minutes in water and draining on a clean dishcloth.
5. Pack the cabbage and seasonings into the sterilized jar, pushing down with a wooden (not metal) spoon.
6. Combine the filtered water with the remaining pickling salt. Pour over the cabbage, filling it so it reaches up to the rim of the jar. Cap loosely with a sterilized canning lid.
7. Place the jar on a tray to catch overflowing juices. The mixture will begin to bubble.
8. After the bubbling stops, check the container. If the water level has fallen below the rim of the jar, top it off with more salt water (keeping a ratio of 1 teaspoon pickling salt per 1 cup of water) that has been warmed slightly so it will dissolve completely.
9. Keep the jar between 65 F and 72 F on the tray for 1 to 3 weeks to achieve a pleasantly sour flavor. After the first week, taste the sauerkraut every few days until it reaches the tartness you desire.
10. Once it is to your liking, skim any (harmless) white spots or film from the top, close the jar tightly with a sterilized canning lid and ring, wipe off the outside of the jar, and store it in the refrigerator.

- Using pickling salt, a fine-grained salt that has no additives, will keep the sauerkraut liquid from clouding, which in itself is not harmful, but creates an unappetizing appearance.
- If you are increasing this recipe, make sure to use the ratio of 1 teaspoon pickling salt per 1 cup of water.
- Whereas canned sauerkraut should be rinsed in a colander before eating to reduce the briny flavor, fresh sauerkraut like this one does not have to be.
- Feel free to add other flavors to the sauerkraut, such as garlic, dill, lemon peel, fennel, and carrot
